



1. Why can people talk and animals can't?


God speaks, and God made people in his image (Genesis 1:26–27) so that they could

talk to Him and to each other. This happened from the very day that God created Adam and Eve. Animals communicate by making noises like barking and snarling, by the odours they emit, by the way they stand and act, but God did not give them the ability to talk in real language. He did not make them in His image.

2. Can all the languages on Earth be traced back to one language?

Not to one language, but to one *event*. At Babel, God suddenly and miraculously programmed the different family groups to speak totally different languages. Noah had 16 grandsons (Genesis chapter 10), so probably this was the number of languages that God supernaturally created at Babel. In the 4,250 years since then, as people groups moved away and became more and more separated from one another, these original languages have gradually changed and split into the 7,000 or so languages in the world today. These can be grouped into about a dozen separate "language families", probably reflecting that original Babel separation.



3. How did all the different people groups form?

When God confused the languages, the different language groups would have separated and spread in families in different directions. Think about skin colour. Some families would have been lighter in colour than others. Some would be darker. Darker skinned people would have survived better in the harsh tropical sun. On the other hand, lighterskinned people would do better in places with long dark winters. So in time people living in different areas ended up with skin colour suited to those areas.

4. How could the people of that day have built such a huge tower?

Among Adam's descendants, Jubal could make and play musical instruments, and Tubal-Cain invented and made all sorts of things out of bronze and iron (Genesis 4:21–22). Noah built a huge ship that was longer than a football field (Genesis 6:15). The people who went away from Babel knew enough to build pyramids in Egypt, China, India, Mexico, and other places, including Babylon, where they were called ziggurats.
